**Angela Stone, Founder & Executive Director of Maine Needs**, shares the story of starting and scaling a non-profit, the key roles volunteers play in providing critical resources in the community, and what it means to them and to the organization to make a difference every day.

### **Breakout Session 1** – Choose a session

#### **1.1: Volunteerism Panel - Environmental Stewardship**

The way that we treat our planet is linked to the ways in which we engage our neighbors and our communities. Stewardship is defined as the responsible management of something entrusted to one's care and so environmental stewardship is the management and care that we offer to the Earth. Conservation is also reliant upon the support of individuals that care for people and planet, volunteering their time and service to maintain its health. This panel brings organizations that engage people from all walks of life in a variety of environmental stewardship activities, from virtual citizen science initiatives to intergenerational acts of community conservation. This panel will speak to the relationship between environmental conservation and volunteerism.

#### **1.2: Stewarding Resilience Building in Your Community; Brenda Zollitsch, USM**

Ever wished you knew some things you could do to help build resilience in your community? This session will introduce you to some of the fundamentals of resilience-building then launch you right into real-world-focused scenario action! Taking a "ripped from the headlines" change event, the session will have the group unpacking the good, the bad and the ugly and identifying opportunities for resilience building. The session leader will share a variety of tools that participants can take back for use in their own communities. The session will engage participants in flexible thinking exercises, asset and vulnerabilities assessment, and planning to overcome the "same old ways" with forward-looking practices that embrace change.

#### **1.3: Voter Engagement for Nonprofits; Mary Alice Scott, MANP**

Many nonprofits mistakenly believe they can't get involved in elections at all. While 501(c)(3) nonprofits are banned from endorsing candidates, there are numerous ways nonprofits can—and should—promote voter and civic engagement as part of their charitable and educational mission. Join this session to learn the basics of limitations and allowable activities. Nonprofits have the power to foster a more inclusive democracy; come see how yours can.

### **Afternoon Civic Engagement Plenary**

*Building Civic Trust from the Ground Up: What Maine’s Civic Health Reveals about Community Engagement*, Nicholas Jacobs, Inaugural Director, Colby Public Policy Lab, Goldfarb Center Faculty Associate Director, Associate Professor of Government

Drawing on recent findings from the Maine Civic Health Index and broader research on place-based civic engagement, this plenary will explore the overlooked foundations of civic life in rural and small-town communities. Professor Jacobs will share new data on how Mainers participate in public life — from volunteering and local problem-solving to trust in institutions — and why national metrics often miss what really matters in local civic ecosystems. The talk will spotlight the role of informal leadership, local volunteer networks, and nontraditional civic actors in sustaining democracy where formal engagement is low but community attachment is high.
